| • The person using the specialized adaptive skiing equipment must have a qualifying disability for which the person utilizes specialized adaptive skiing equipment to access lifts and slopes, and is not required to provide advance notice of, or obtain advance permission for, use of such specialized adaptive skiing equipment. | |
| • Skiers with a qualifying disability are persons, meeting the definition contained in the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 as amended by the ADA Amendments Act of 2008, Section 12102, with a physical or mental impairment which is expected to last more than six (6) months, that substantially limits that person's ability to ski or snowboard, negotiate slopes/ trails, or meet the general requirements to use Ski Area lifts and runs. | |
| • Examples of specialized adaptive skiing equipment used by disabled individuals are mono-skis, bi-skis, outriggers, skibobs, skibikes, ski trikes, and other sit-skis.
